| Description | <p>The climate change emergency is one of the greatest environmental and social crises of our time and represents one of the most pressing global ones. In ASEAN, this has been recognised in <i>the Framework for Circular Economy for AEC</i>, <i>ASEAN Strategy for Carbon Neutrality</i>, and <i>ASEAN Blue Economy Framework</i>.</p> <p>Regulation is a key tool for governments to achieve any policy goal, and will especially be relevant to addressing the environmental crises. This places a focus on developing effective regulations, which require the use of Good Regulatory Practices (GRP). When thoughtfully applied to the realm of climate change, GRP serves as a powerful tool to ensure that policies and regulations can be well-designed, transparent, efficient, and conducive to achieve broader climate goals. These should be combined with an international regulatory co-operation approach to deal with the transboundary nature of these environmental challenges.</p> <p>This session will discuss how members can leverage regulatory policy tools to achieve sustainable growth for all by sharing their experiences on using GRPs in responding to environmental challenges.</p> |

In a world that is constantly shifting its priorities and addressing new and complex challenges, there is a growing need to ensure that all people are included as part of this change.</p> <p>This second thematic session will focus on how GRPs can be used as a catalyst for social advancement. It will discuss new, innovative approaches which governments are taking to understand social impacts, distributional impacts and the challenges they are facing when designing or evaluating regulations.</p> <p>ASEAN countries will be invited to share their perspectives on this emerging area of work and highlight some of their innovative practices that support people to be agents of their own change.</p> |
